# 'Waiting for the Miracle'

Dear St. Peter's Family,

THIS PAST SUNDAY, I taught the first class for our 2025 Confirmation candidates. At the end, I walked them through the Nave to show them how all the different parts of the Church contribute to our work we call "liturgy." One of the candidates asked a seemingly simple, yet profound



question, "Why do we use different words for things?" I told the class that everything we say and do during worship is intentionally odd to remind us that we are a community unlike any other we find in the world. So, we say odd things like, "The Lord be with you." We wear odd things like acolyte robes. We eat odd things like a tiny bit of bread and a sip of wine. In the words of our faith, we are a holy community that says and does holy things as an expression of our love for our God of holiness.

Our Church *Kalendar* reflects this truth, which is why it's traditionally spelled with a "k." The holy year doesn't begin on January 1, but on the first day of Advent. This time around, it's December 1. Of all the major seasons of the liturgical year, Advent is the only one with a triple focus. Easter is all about resurrection. For Pentecost, it's the Holy Spirit. But Advent is about arrival, or more accurately, arrivals. Here we ponder Jesus' first advent in the Incarnation of the Nativity. It's a time to pause and prepare ourselves for the joy Christmastide will bring. This requires us to wait, and as a profound sage once said, "the waiting is the hardest part." When we bust out our Advent calendars, it reminds us we have 25 long days until Christmas. Of course, we're excited about trees, treats, and presents, but we all know it is much more than that. What we are most looking forward to is celebrating Christ's birth together with our families and this parish family. And this anticipation is palpable.

Advent is also when we prepare ourselves for Jesus' second arrival. For the better part of 2000 years, the Church has debated the meaning of our Lord's return. But we must always connect it to his first coming, so it's really about one thing—joy. When Jesus arrived into the world, he transformed it and made it good once again. When he arrives again, he will complete this perfection of all of creation. So, Advent brings rebirth. For you. For me. For every quark of the universe. But here's the thing—those are the big "a" Advents. In the meantime, Jesus doesn't leave us on our own. By the Holy Spirit, Christ is present in us and in those we see in our daily lives. So, he is already here with an open invitation to become new again. And this is nothing short of a miracle.

I wish you all a blessed Advent and a joyful Christmastide, Nate

#### **MUSIC IN ADVENT**

Advent means "coming" or "arrival." This four-week preparation for Christmas is an anticipation of the feast of Jesus' birth and a reminder that Christ will come again in great power and glory to judge both the living and the dead.

During the season, blue hangings are used the first, second, and fourth Sundays. The Third Sunday of Advent is called *Gaudete* Sunday, a day of celebration that marks the shift in emphasis from "The Lord is coming" to "The Lord is near," and rose vestments are worn by the clergy. The *Gloria in excelsis* is replaced by the *Kyrie* and the liturgy begins with the penitential order (BCP page 351).

The preparation for the choral Eucharist begins with a *voluntary*—an Anglican term for *prelude*. It is said that an organ prelude serves to remind us that we are in church, getting ready to pray. Most organists play works based on chorales or hymn tunes for services,

which helps to provide a musical invitation to congregational song in the service.

On the First Sunday of Advent, the voluntary will be Johann Sebastian Bach's well known setting of *Wachet auf! ruft uns die Stimme (Wake up! a voice is calling*), and we will sing the hymn, *'Sleepers, wake!' A voice astounds us (The Hymnal 1982*, 61).

On the Second Sunday of Advent, the voluntary will be another of Bach's works, Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland (Now come, Savior of the Nations), and we will sing the hymn Savior of the nations, come! (The Hymnal 1982, 54). This hymn is well known through many transcriptions, including one for piano by the 19th century composer Ferruccio Busoni.

On the Third Sunday of Advent, the men of the choir will sing the Advent prose Rorate caeli desuper (Drop down, heavens from above), a paraphrase of Isaiah 45:8: "Shower, O havens, from above, and let the skies rain down righteousness." The voluntary will be a prelude based on that tune by the 20th century French composer Jeanne Demessieux.

On the Fourth Sunday of Lent, the voluntary will be *Fuga sopra il Magnificat*, a setting long thought to be by Bach, but likely composed by his pupil Johann Ludwig Krebs.

The Parish Choir will sing a traditional Introit at the beginning of each Advent Sunday as the Advent wreath is lit. *Introit* comes from the old beginning of the Eucharist: *Introibo ad altare Dei* ("I will go to the altar of God," Psalm 43:4), and the text traditionally includes a Psalm verse and the *Gloria Patri* (see BCP page 141).

Music in church—like candles, flowers, and vestments—helps to remind us that we are in the presence of the holy and the sacred. I hope the music in this Advent season brings us all closer to the holy mysteries we celebrate with great joy every Sunday. —Mark Trautman

# Annual Parish Meeting—Sunday, January 19, 2025

The Annual Meeting of St. Peter's Church will be Sunday, January 19, 2025, following the 10 am Eucharist. Come cast your vote for your Warden, Vestry Members, and Diocesan Convention delegates. Those elected to the Vestry, and those elected to represent the parish in Diocesan capacities are expected to be faithful in their attendance at worship and to set an example in stewardship.

# The Episcopal Church defines the qualifications of votes and officers to be elected:

- The voters shall be baptized, at least 16 years of age, domiciled in the Parish, of good moral character, adhering to this Church and to no other religious body, regular attendants at the services of the Church in said Parish, meaning thereby those who are more frequently present than absent, and regular contributors to the current expenses of the Parish in the manner prescribed by the Vestry.
- The qualified voters shall elect such officers who shall be communicants in good standing. The term "communicant" shall be taken to mean a person who has been confirmed by a Bishop of this Church or by a Bishop of a Church in communion with this Church or has been received into this Church by a Bishop of this Church, and who shall have received the Holy Communion at least once during the preceding year.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

Each person in charge a committee or program should prepare a written report about the ministry and activities of your group or committee.

Financial reports are due, including receipts—opening balance, receipts, (list categories, not single items), total receipts, balance and total. Disbursements (list categories, not single items), total disbursements, year's closing balance disbursements, and closing balance.

Treasurers must include reports of monies in all saving accounts using the same information above.

# CALLED TO SERVICE: VESTRY What does the Vestry do?

It is the legal governing body of the parish, the "board of trustees." With the rector as its leader, it sets policy and goals and oversees the finances and property. In addition, it has another equally important role: providing leadership to implement the ministries that serve the parish and the wider community. The Vestry actively supports the work and ministry of the parish

#### Who can run for Vestry?

Any baptized member of the Episcopal Church who has been a member of St. Peter's in good standing for at least one year, is at least 16 years old, makes a regular financial contribution to the parish, and worships regularly at St. Peter's.

#### Is there an expected time commitment?

Yes. A standard term is three years. The Vestry meets once each month. And, because every vestry member's voice counts, our goal is for members to allow no more than three unexcused absences from regular meetings in a year.

#### What do we look for in a vestry member?

Someone who is involved in some parish ministry, and preferably (but not necessarily) has shown some leadership ability. They should keep informed about the parish and be willing to contribute to working out solutions to issues that arise. Every Vestry member should work respectfully with other members and participate in discerning the parish's vision and encouraging its ministries. The Vestry affords people the opportunity to share a variety of their own gifts and talents.

# How are Vestry members chosen?

Candidates are nominated by the Nominating Committee, whose recommendation must be approved by the Vestry, and they are elected at the annual meeting.

#### **How does the Nominating Committee work?**

It accepts suggestions from parishioners, discusses possible candidates, decides who it thinks should be nominated, makes sure people are willing to run, and presents a proposed slate to the Vestry. The approved nominees are then announced to the parish.

#### How do I nominate someone?

You may complete and give this form to Fr. Nate or a member of the Nominating Committee, or put it in the alms basin, or send it to the Parish Office. (info@stpetersef.org) You may nominate yourself or someone else.
