FROM THE RECTOR

The Epiphany of the Epiphany

Dear St. Peter's Family,

THIS PAST THURSDAY, I went to the pharmacy to pick up some items. It was the first day after my holiday break and I needed to get an early start on the day, so I went early in the morning. At first, I didn't notice anyone in the store, but as I went through the candy aisles (my favorite pathway) to make my way back to the pharmacist, I saw a clerk kneeling



down with some opened boxes surrounded by empty shelves. The boxes were filled with Valentine's Day chocolates. It was January 2nd. While we are all aware, and we often make fun of, the fact that retailers jump from one holiday to another as quickly as possible, this speaks to something about who we are as human beings. We like to celebrate. And who can blame us? We work hard. We try to do the right thing. We all experience the normal trials of everyday life, so we should make the most of our opportunities to party. Because we need it.

Our faith and our common life speaks to this need. There is no church time that isn't a celebration. Our Christmas Season lasts from December 25 to January 5. Before that, we were in Advent. Before that, Christ the King. But after Christmastide we don't jump to Valentine's Day (Actually, it was removed from the saints' calendar a long time ago.). We dive into a new season, Epiphany, right away on January 6. And our Book of Common Prayer rightly says that the first day of Epiphany is one of the major feasts of the Church, on the same level as All Saints', Christmas, and Easter. So, while the secular world is in a liminal state waiting for cards, cupids, and heart-shaped candies, St. Peter's moves from one joyful feast to another.

The word *epiphany* comes from the Greek word that means "appearance." In the ancient world, this could mean the appearance of sunlight in the morning or an appearance of someone that had been away on a journey, but it primarily meant the appearance of a deity. In our faith, this primarily refers to God's appearance in Jesus Christ. As a liturgical season, we observe this by recalling the visitation of the Magi at Christ's birth, the Baptism of Jesus, and the Wedding at Cana—Jesus' first miracle. In modern parlance, epiphany has also been taken to mean a moment of profound insight, a bit of new information or a new experience. And as it turns out, this is also spot on, too.

We tell and retell the stories of God's Epiphany in Jesus because those are historical moments that have transformed all of creation and continue to make all things new. But we also remember them because Jesus is still with us today, popping up in little epiphanies. Whether it's something as profound as a bolt of lightning or as subtle as the falling snow on a winter night, Jesus is appearing to us. So, we need to be open to those opportunities because these moments can be an epiphany, a new experience, that can change us and the trajectory of our lives. And all those times are opportunities to celebrate.

Annual Parish Meeting—Sunday, January 19, 2025

The Annual Meeting of St. Peter's Church will be Sunday, January 19, 2025, following the 10 am Eucharist. Come cast your votes! Those elected to the Vestry, and those elected to represent the parish in Diocesan capacities are expected to be faithful in their attendance at worship and to set an example in stewardship.

The Episcopal Church defines the qualifications of votes and officers to be elected:

- The voters shall be baptized, at least 16 years of age, domiciled in the Parish, of good moral character, adhering to this Church and to no other religious body, regular attendants at the services of the Church in said Parish, meaning thereby those who are more frequently present than absent, and regular contributors to the current expenses of the Parish in the manner prescribed by the Vestry.
- The qualified voters shall elect such officers who shall be communicants in good standing. The term "communicant" shall be taken to mean a person who has been confirmed by a Bishop of this Church or by a Bishop of a Church in communion with

this Church or has been received into this Church by a Bishop of this Church, and who shall have received the Holy Communion at least once during the preceding year.

VESTRY NOMINATING COMMITTEE

POSITIONS OPEN INCLUDE: Five Vestry positions: two for two-year terms; three for three-year terms; Three delegates to Diocesan Convention; Three alternates to Diocesan Convention.

CALLED TO SERVICE: VESTRY What does the Vestry do?

It is the legal governing body of the parish. With the rector as its leader, it sets policy and goals and oversees the finances and property. In addition, it has another equally important role: providing leadership to implement the ministries that serve the parish and the wider community. The Vestry actively supports the work and ministry of the parish

Who can run for Vestry?

Any baptized member of the Episcopal Church who has been a member of St. Peter's in good standing for at least one year, is at least 16 years old, makes a regular financial contribution to the parish, and worships regularly at St. Peter's.

Is there an expected time commitment?

Yes. A standard term is three years. The Vestry meets once each month. And, because every vestry member's voice counts, our goal is for members to allow no more than three unexcused absences from regular meetings in a year.

What do we look for in a vestry member?

Someone who is involved in some parish ministry, and preferably (but not necessarily) has shown some leadership ability. They should keep informed about the parish and be willing to contribute to working out solutions to issues that arise. Every Vestry member should work respectfully with other members and participate in discerning the parish's vision and encouraging its ministries. The Vestry affords people the opportunity to share a variety of their own gifts and talents.

How are Vestry members chosen?

Candidates are nominated by the Nominating Committee, whose recommendation must be approved by the Vestry, and they are elected at the annual meeting.

How do I nominate someone?

You may complete and give this form to Fr. Nate or a member of the Nominating Committee, or put it in the alms basin, or send it to the Parish Office. (info@stpetersef.org) You may nominate yourself or someone else.
