ABSALOM JONES SUNDAY

Today we remember the life, ministry, and witness of Blessed Absalom Jones, the first Black man ordained to the Episcopal priesthood. Together with Bishop Richard Allen, they formed the Free African Society, in 1787 the first organized Afro-American society; Jones and Richard Allen were elected overseers. In 1792, the Society began to build a church, which was dedicated on July 17, 1794. In October 1794 the church was admitted as St. Thomas African Episcopal Church (http://www.aecst.org) and still thrives to this day. Bishop William White of Pennsylvania ordained Jones as deacon in 1795 and as priest on September 21, 1802. Known as "the Black Bishop of the Episcopal Church," Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the Church as God's instrument.
